SIR WILFRID LAURIER SCHOOL BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 2016-2017 Message from the Chairperson

The 2016-2017 school year has been another busy year for the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board (SWLSB). Thanks to the hard work and dedication of all our stakeholders, we saw many projects come to completion during the year and others begin.

A major highlight among these projects was the construction of the new vocational centre in Saint-Eustache in partnership with Commission scolaire de la Seigneurie-des-Mille-Îles, which got under way this year. This was a great achievement for both partner school boards as this project had been in development for more than 10 years! As of September 2017, we will be offering five bilingual programs in high-demand trades in the construction sector. In Laval, we completed the construction project for Twin Oaks Elementary and inaugurated the school's new extension. As a result, the school capacity has increased from 399 to 738 students.

This has been an important year for Laurentian Regional High School. Premier Couillard and his team visited the school and met with students, staff and members of the Council of Commissioners to discuss regional challenges and bring forth solutions. The swimming pool

rejuvenation project for this high school was made possible thanks to another major partnership between our school board, Commission scolaire de la Rivière-du-Nord, the Regional County Municipality of Argenteuil and the City of Lachute. Students can now enjoy a variety of sports throughout the year as well as aquatic activities during physical education class.



The Regroupement lavallois pour la réussite éducative was launched in 2016. As a board member of this regional committee, the SWLSB works on initiatives with local community organizations and our schools to improve perseverance and educational success for all youth and adult students in Laval. Our school board is also a board member of the PREL, Partenaires pour la réussite éducative dans les Laurentides, and we regularly participated in board meetings throughout the year, as well as Hooked on School Days across our 3L territory (Laval, Laurentides and Lanaudière).

The SWLSB also implemented the new History of Québec and Canada program in Secondary III in 2016. This implementation was based on the recommendation of the Directors of English Education Network (DEEN), an organization that represents all nine English school boards. Expanding the curriculum over two years provided a much needed reform to what was a very challenging course for our students and professionals. History, as always, comes with interpretations, and this new program is not an exception. We are grateful our teachers will have the opportunity to address content and provide their students History lessons that are pedagogically sound and socially respectful.

And, most important of all, our graduation rate continues to rise despite budget cuts and regional challenges. The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board ranks among the top ten school boards of this province and boasts an 85.9% graduation rate! We continue to offer "An English Education, A Bilingual Future" to all our students, and are proud that SWLSB students rank first in the province on the ministry's Français, langue seconde exams.

Always remember that education belongs to the community, and everyone has a role to play to ensure education remains a priority. Thank you to our teachers, staff, administrators, parents and students, for ensuring the success of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER SCHOOL BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 2016-2017 Strategic Plan & Partnership Agreement

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board schools range in enrolment from 60 students in an elementary school in a rural Laurentian setting to more than 1,600 students in our largest secondary school located in Laval.

This annual report focuses on the final year of the 2012-2017 Partnership Agreement that was developed and accepted as the operating agreement between our school board and the Ministère de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur (MEES).

Over the past few years we have significantly changed our practices to become more data-driven and have developed new and innovative ways of examining our results and tracking the success of our students in our schools and centres.

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board boasts an 85.9% graduation rate and is proud to rank in the top ten in the province.

Goal 5: An increase in the number of students under 20 enrolled in Vocational Training

Vocational Training

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board offers a range of vocational training programs to meet the diverse interests of young adults under 20. There has been a substantial growth in the student population between 2011 and 2017. In the 2016-2017 school year, the student population increased by 15%, with 131 students registered in vocational education programs. This represents an increase of 31% above our 2017 target.

Once again, the sector has seen an increase in enrolments within this target population. As per previous years, studies in Carpentry and in Health, Assistance and Nursing remain popular, with 39 and 21 students respectively registered in these two programs. In addition, the influx of international students has contributed to the overall 15% increase in enrolment.

Enrolment in all other programs offered through the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board has remained constant throughout the years.

Career exploration opportunities were also supported through organized visits to both CDC Pont-Viau and CDC Saint-Eustache. These visits gave students the opportunity to participate in program-specific activities and experience vocational education first-hand. The centres will continue to offer and improve these events.

Adult Education

For the General Adult Education sector, academic and general interest courses are offered at CDC Vimont and CDC Lachute and in our satellite location at Joliette High School. These courses are available to students who are at least 16 years of age before July 1st of the year of their application. Academic classes enable students to obtain the required credits for a high school diploma or the prerequisites for enrolling in a vocational program or continuing their post-secondary education.

In 2016-2017, there were 1077 students registered in Adult Education classes in our centres across our three territories. The overall contribution to the SWLSB graduation rate has remained stable.



Celebrating Success



Laurier Gala | Star Fest

The Laurier Gala/Star Fest has become a tradition students look forward to! This evening is meant to celebrate and recognize students who achieved outstanding results in Academics, School Perseverance, Sports, Arts and Community Involvement. The entertainment portion of the gala features performances by students who won the Star Fest auditions. This annual celebration brings together more than 1200 people from across our territory.



Inauguration of the enlargement at Twin Oaks

The long-awaited extension of Twin Oaks Elementary was inaugurated in December 2016, increasing the school's capacity from 399 to 738 students. After many years of being in overcrowded conditions, students and staff now have room to continue growing.



Premier visits Laurentian Regional High

Premier Philippe Couillard visited Laurentian Regional High School in March. Students were incredible: engaged, curious and brilliant. This was a shining moment for the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board and LRHS as we showcased why we are one of the top ten boards in the province! The Premier, Minister Christine St-Pierre, and Argenteuil MP Yves St-Denis stayed for lunch with the students. It was a unique opportunity to share concerns from our community, as well as share our successes and accomplishments.



McCaig Elementary's Parc École

On June 19, the Town of Rosemere donated \$40,000 to McCaig Elementary School for the revitalization of its playground. The development of play areas at school is essential to the well-being of our students. The contribution will be used for installing two swings and refurbishing the existing playground. As of the new school year, our students will get to enjoy their new facilities.

Construction of a Vocational Training Centre in Saint-Eustache

In May 2016, the groundbreaking ceremony of the new CSSMI-SWLSB Vocational Training Centre, which results from a partnership between the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board (SWLSB) and Commission scolaire de la Seigneurie-des-Mille-Îles (CSSMI), took place with all partners involved. Construction got underway during the 2016-2017 school year. The centre will service the English- and French-speaking clientele of the region, in a bilingual setting, starting in the fall of 2017.



SWLSB Annual Softball, Soccer and Hockey Games for School Perseverance

In August, September and February, annual softball, soccer and hockey games took place during which SWLSB staff and students from Laval Junior High played friendly games with Ville de Laval officials. This partnership with Ville de Laval promotes healthy lifestyle habits and the importance of persevering in school.

In February, hundreds of students from the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board and school boards in the greater Montreal region took part in the launch of the book and CD of *L'Or du roi Midas* at the Palace Convention Centre in Laval.

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier Foundation Citizenship Bursary is awarded on behalf of the Foundation, a non-profit organization that works in collaboration with businesses, parents and schools to build partnerships with the goal of giving back to the students of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board. Over the past 13 years, the Foundation has invested more than \$700,000 in our schools and centres and has awarded each year citizenship bursaries to graduating students in the youth and adult sectors. The money raised by the Foundation comes from two major fundraisers held in January and June.



The Foundation, in partnership with the school board, also finances the annual Laurier Gala/Star Fest, an evening that recognizes more than 200 students in our school board and highlights the musical talents of over 20 students.

Parents' Committee 2016-2017

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier Parents' Committee is composed of one representative from each of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board's 35 schools (26 elementary schools and 9 high schools), elected during the meeting of parents at the annual general assembly, pursuant to section 189 of the Education Act. One representative from the Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) also sits on the Parents' Committee, designated by and from among the parents who are members of SEAC.

The Parents' Committee has its first meeting to elect a chair and the executive committee members in October (section 190 of the Education Act). Subsequent meetings are held on the first Thursday of the month until June, in the boardroom of the Administration Centre of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board at 235, montée Lesage, in Rosemère. This year, eight meetings were held.

The Parents' Committee is a committee composed of parents whose mandate is to promote the participation of parents at all levels to allow them to have a voice in their children's education. The committee plays an important role in the success of our students. It advises the school board by means of consultation, informs members and parents within the community on various issues and offers them training, holds conferences with guest speakers, and recognizes and promotes students' perseverance and achievements through student awards. The committee also recommends members on the Special Education Advisory Committee.

It has been a busy year for the Parents' Committee and I would like to thank all members for their involvement, dedication and time. Their valuable input enriched the exchange of ideas for the betterment of our students.
