# 2.0 Swearing-in of New Commissioner

The Chairperson introduced the President of Elections for the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board (SWLSB), Sergio Gentile, and invited him to report on the recent by-election in Electoral Division 6.

Mr. Gentile presented his report noting that the grace period for requesting a recount had expired and that no recount had been requested. He went on to declare Barbara Barrasso duly elected as Commissioner for Electoral Division 6 and proceeded to swear Ms. Barrasso into her new role.

The Chairperson and the Director General congratulated Ms. Barrasso on her election as Commissioner for Electoral Division 6 and welcomed her to the table and to the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board.

The Chairperson thanked Mr. Gentile for undertaking the role of President of Elections and for conducting a transparent by-election.

## 3.0 Recognition - LGBTQ+ Initiative at LRHS

The Chairperson welcomed Sam Craig, Ziyen Hamelin and Madison Lummis, students at Laurentian Regional High School (LRHS), and Melanie Bujold, CLC Coordinator at LRHS, to the meeting noting that they are present this evening to be recognized, along with Zoe Ducheneau and Leo Scharley who could not be present this evening, for their unique and very colourful endeavor with the LGBTQ+ Pride Sidewalk Project.

On June 1st, 2022, he and Parent Commissioner Adam Gordon attended a press conference held by the Ville de Lachute (the Ville) to unveil the pride sidewalk and a plaque that explains the evolution of the sidewalk leading to the Bibliothèque Jean-Marc-Belzile. The sidewalk was painted by students from LRHS and Polyvalente Lavigne. It was the school's Gay Straight Alliance (the Alliance) that approached the Mayor of the Ville de Lachute with this project and it was accepted a part of the Ville's desire to be more inclusive and welcoming.

At the invitation of the Chairperson, Ms. Bujold noted that a Gay Straight Alliance was established at the school and that there was a lot of interest from the students. The Alliance members had many ideas on how to bring recognition to the LGBTQ+ community in the area and approached the Ville to encourage the recognition of Pride month. The Mayor of the Ville de Lachute supported the project and provided some municipal services to help with the sidewalk. The students are to be commended for their work.

In response to a question from the Chairperson, Ms. Bujold noted that, although May is an exam period, the Alliance students were able to get the sidewalk ready for June 1st, the first day of Pride month. The project was broken down into sections for the front sidewalk and a small stretch of sidewalk behind the library. The colours used are those that are part of the Pride flag. The sidewalk is also interactive.

The Chairperson thanked them for attending this evening's meeting and wished them well with future endeavors.

- 2021-2022 SWLSB in numbers highlighted
  - The 88.1% graduation rate which puts the school board in the top ten provincially. The goal is 90% by 2030, and the SWLSB is up to the challenge;
  - The servicing of 14,018 students in the youth and adult sectors. The school board has exceeded the MEQ's projects for the 2022-2023 school year;
  - The thirteen Vocational Training programs, eight at CDC Pont-Viau and three at Construc-Plus Training Centre. This is a sector that relies on constant promotion.

- Summer School 2022 will take place from July 4-24, 2022, at Laval Junior Academy and offers the opportunity to students to graduate and improve results. The SWLF is to be thanked for making it possible for students who live far from the Summer School location to be able to participate from a distance;

WHEREAS policies no. 2000-HR-01: Regulating the Working Conditions of Management Staff Represented by the Sir Wilfrid Laurier Administrators' Association and no. 2000-HR-02: Regulating the Working Conditions of Management Staff Represented by the Association québécoise des cadres scolaires – Sir Wilfrid Laurier Section, have been applied (the Management Policies);

WHEREAS this position was posted and a Selection Committee held interviews on June 15, 2022;

Commissioner Donna Anber MOVED THAT, on the recommendation of the Selection Committee, the Council of Commissioners of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board appoint Odie Miller-Maboungou as Assistant Director of Pedagogical Services in accordance with the Management Policies of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board, effective August 15, 2022.

Carried unanimously

The Chairperson congratulated Ms. Miller Maboungou and welcomed her to the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board.

Ms. Miller Maboungou thanked everyone for the opportunity to become a member of this school board noting that it is an honour.

The Director General noted that Ms. Miller Maboungou's experience will be a great asset to the school board as new ideas and outlooks are always appreciated.

The Director of Pedagogical Services noted that he had ceded his seat on the Selection Committee to the incoming Director of Pedagogical Services, who is going to do a wonderful job and wishes her well.

The Chairperson noted that this evening marks the last meeting of Geoffrey Hipps, Director of Pedagogical Services, and extended appreciation, on behalf of the Council and the school board, for all of his contributions, hard work and dedication over the years and wished him a healthy and happy retirement.

### 9.2 Financial Resources

### 9.2.1 2022-2023 Initial Budget

The Director of Financial Resources presented the key elements of the 2022-2023 initial budget noting:

- The initial budget is based on the consultation parameters. The initial parameters will only be available at a later date;
- The assumptions will be revised once the initial parameters are received and the official enrolment is confirmed:
- The tax rate for 2022-2023 has been lowered from \$0.1054 per \$100.00 evaluation to \$0.1024;
- Projected enrolment is the element that drives the budget;
- The initial budget for 2022-2023 is \$207,748,701.00;
- The revenues from the MEQ account for more than 70 percent of the overall budget with the balance coming from local needs financing and other sources of revenue, such as daycare, Qualificaction and other self-financing activities;
- The largest expenses for the school board are the teacher envelope, special needs, decentralized measures, transportation, Adult Education and Vocational Training, other educational activities and other MEQ measures. The management of the school board and transportation are funded from other sources;
- Overall systems costs have been indexed by two percent for salaries on April 1, 2022, due
  to the new collective agreements, 4.1 percent for local needs, and transportation needs
  are indexed by 3.4 percent, which could be revised to eight percent to meet the demands
  of the transporters for the new contracts. It must be noted 909.94 teachers have been
  allocated by the MEQ for 2022-2023 but the school board has allocated 917.55 leaving a
  deficit of 7.61 in ETPs or \$750,000.00. There will be revisions to the ETPs once the final
  enrolment figures are confirmed later this fall;
- Other educational activities The number of homeschooled students has increased significantly since the 2016-2017 school year, most probably due to COVID-19, but the numbers should decrease as the cases of COVID-19 decrease and parents send their children back to school;

### Measures:

- Decentralized measures will be increased by \$1,623,939.00, for 2022-2023;
- Special needs measures will be increased by \$1,317,665.00, for 2022-2023;
- Small school measures will receive a \$595.00, increase for 2022-2023;
- The funding in unrestricted measures can be moved around without any limitations;
- Dedicated measures can be moved around but the limitation is that it must be within the family of measures it is associated with:
- Protected measures are limited to being used within the criteria and cannot be used for anything else;
- Eight protected measures will become dedicated measures;
- There are new decentralized measures:
- Measures for special needs have been indexed to meet the increases brought on by the new collective agreements;
- School board management has been increased by 3.6 percent for salaries, energy consumption and building maintenance;
- There are new measures to compensate for the lower tax rate, recruitment resources, building maintenance and information technology security;
- Transportation for 2022-2023 will be \$14,853,761.00, part of which will be funded through local needs (\$6,284,198.00), and the MEQ (\$8,469,563.00), for an increase of \$568,852.00. Currently, the funding from the MEQ is insufficient given that it has yet to reach an agreement with the transporters, a situation that will be monitored closely over the summer months;
- Daycare Services will be impacted by the new regulation that will come into effect on July 1st, 2022.
- Capital investments will see an increase of \$2,446, 880.00 for 2022-2023;
- Elements to consider are that the parameters on which this budget is built are not the final
  version, there may be new measures announced, precisions are needed for transportation
  and there is no measure for COVID-19 at this time.

The Chairperson extended appreciation to the Director of Financial Resources and his team for all of the time that went into preparing this initial budget noting that the stakeholders will be very happy to see the lower tax rate.

In response to a question from Commissioner Donna Anber, the Director of Financial Resources noted that there are many new annexes to the collective agreements and that the allocation of any funds emanating from an election campaign promise will have to be looked at by a committee.

- a number of 23,926 taxable immovables of more than \$25,000.00, and
- the rate of \$ 0.1024 per \$100 of the assessment set by the Minister for the 2022-2023 school tax;

Parent Commissioner Stéphane Henley MOVED THAT, on the recommendation of the Advisory Committee - Administration, the Council of Commissioners of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board adopt the operating, investment and debt service budget for the 2022-2023 school year, providing for revenues of \$207,749,249 and expenses of \$207,749,249, subject to the authorization of the Minister, in accordance with section 279 of the *Education Act*;

AND THAT it be submitted to the Ministère de l'Éducation.

### PQI Request - Sector 7

WHEREAS the Québec Government allocates funds to school boards and school service centres on an annual basis to assist in the construction and expansion of schools and centres;

WHEREAS school boards and school service centres are required to submit their requests annually through the Plan québécois des infrastructures (PQI);

WHEREAS, in its 2020-2030, 2021-2031 and 2022-2032 PQI requests, the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board (SWLSB) included a request for a new school in the Saint-Jérôme area which has not been retained by the Ministère de l'Éducation (MEQ);

WHEREAS the building capacity of Laurentia Elementary School in Saint-Jérôme is recognized by the MEQ as having eight classrooms;

WHEREAS the population in the Saint-Jérôme area is growing on an annual basis;

WHEREAS, for the 2022-2023 school year, 16-classroom groups have been authorized for Laurentia Elementary School, representing a 200 percent overcapacity;

WHEREAS the SWLSB has undertaken to alleviate the overcrowding situation at Laurentia Elementary School with the installation of two portable classrooms in the summer of 2020 and the upcoming installation of two additional portable classrooms in the summer of 2022, representing approximately 50 percent of the school's effective capacity, while encroaching upon the school yard/play space of the students;

WHEREAS, even with the installation of two additional portable classrooms this summer, the school will still be lacking space when the 2022-2023 school year begins;

WHEREAS there is also a significant lack of space for student development and for non-teaching professionals to meet and assist students with learning difficulties;

WHEREAS, while the SWLSB has leased the building adjacent to Laurentia Elementary School and is currently analyzing the possibility of renovating it to accommodate two to three classrooms, this is far from an ideal solution to alleviate the overcrowding situation:

WHEREAS, over the next four to five years, the number of classroom groups at Laurentia Elementary School will continue to increase and the SWLSB is out of options to accommodate this growth;

WHEREAS, even though the SWLSB has other elementary schools in the Laurentians, the nearest are up to 35 kilometres away and are also at capacity and cannot accommodate any additional students:

WHEREAS the SWLSB has approached the Centre de services scolaire de la Rivière-du-Nord to inquire if they might have space available, and they have confirmed that there is no space available in the Saint-Jérôme area;

WHEREAS the Governing Board of Laurentia Elementary School adopted a resolution requesting the MEQ to approve the request of the SWLSB for a new school in the Lower Laurentians to alleviate the overcrowding situation at the school, and said resolution was submitted to the MEQ by the SWLSB as part of its update to the 2022-2032 PQI in March 2022;

WHEREAS, now that the lack of space at Laurentia Elementary School has reached the critical level, the MEQ must reconsider its decision concerning the SWLSB's request for a new school in Sector 7:

WHEREAS the MEQ, when reconsidering its decision, must also take into account that Laurentia Elementary School ranks as an eight on the Socio-Economic Environment Index (IMSE);

WHEREAS the SWLSB is committed to providing learning and working environments that promote health, safety and well-being as per its Commitment-to-Success plan;

Parent Commissioner Tara Anderson MOVED THAT, on the recommendation of the Director of Material Resources and Transportation, the Council of Commissioners of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board formally request the Ministère de l'Éducation to reconsider its decision with regard to the request made for a new school in Saint-Jérôme to alleviate the lack of space at Laurentia Elementary School;

AND THAT the mandate be given to the Chairperson of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board to write a letter outlining this request and the concerns of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board;

FURTHER THAT this letter be sent to the Ministère de l'Éducation with a copy of this resolution.
