2.0 Recognition

The Chairperson advised the Council that on November 29, 2022, he had the honour of attending the inauguration of a Sensory Room at Souvenir Elementary School (SES). The establishment of this special room is due to the generosity of the Panagiotopoulos Family (the family) whose children attend the school.

He went on to note that a sensory room is a therapeutic safe space with a variety of equipment that provides students with special needs or limited communication skills with personalized sensory input and helps them calm and focus themselves so they can be better prepared for learning and interacting with others.

The time children spend in a sensory room helps them improve their visual, auditory and tactile processing, as well as fine and gross motor skills. It also helps students manage negative thoughts and emotions.

Sensory rooms provide opportunities for engagement in prevention and crisis de-escalation strategies and promote self-care/self-nurturance, resilience and recovery.

The family met with the principal of SES during the 2021-2022 school year to discuss this project that they wanted to leave as a legacy in their son's name, as this is his last year in elementary school, for all of the support, dedication and quality of services he has been receiving while attending the school.

The establishment of the Sensory Room was a group effort between the SES and the family, with the school refurbishing the room and the family donating the sensory equipment. For Mrs. Panagiotopoulos, this Sensory Room was a labour of love and she has dedicated numerous hours volunteering, hours that are so valuable to the students.

The Council is very appreciative of the generosity of the family and tonight recognizes the entire Panagiotopoulos Family for their selfless generosity to the students of Souvenir Elementary School.

The Chairperson presented the Panagiotopoulos Family with a plaque that will be mounted outside of the Sensory Room to honour their generous donation that will benefit many students, today and in the years to come.

Mr. Panagiotopoulos thanked the Council on behalf of the family noting that it was a pleasure to be able to give back to SES as its students and staff have been so supportive of their son.

The Chairperson thanked the Panagiotopouls Family for being present this evening.

The Chairperson welcomed Adam Gordon, Chairperson of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier Parents' Committee and former Secondary Parent Commissioner, to the meeting noting that Mr. Gordon is the Chairperson of the Parents' Committee (PC) and has been since 2018. He was elected as Secondary Parent Commissioner in 2020, as well as Vice-Chairperson of the Council of Commissioners, and held both roles until this fall.

Mr. Gordon has been invited this evening in order for the Council to recognize him for his commitment to the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board and express appreciation for all the knowledge he brought to the table.

The Chairperson thanked Mr. Gordon on behalf of the Council and presented him with a certificate of recognition.

Mr. Gordon thanked the Council for this recognition and wished the new Secondary Parent Commissioner good luck in the role.

3.0 Approval of Minutes – November 23, 2022

Parent Commissioner Stéphane Henley MOVED THAT the minutes of the regular meeting of the Council of Commissioners of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board held on November 23, 2022, having been received by all members prior to this meeting, be approved as written and exempt from public reading by the Secretary General.

4.0 Question Period

The Secretary General and Director of the Legal, Corporate and Communications Department explained the parameters of the two question periods of 20 minutes each and drew attention to where people online can type in their questions for the second question period. There were no questions for the first question period.

She noted that the second question period is for questions related to agenda items only.

5.0 Report from the Chairperson

The Chairperson welcomed everyone to the last meeting of the 2022 year noting that, before presenting his report, he has additional information concerning the article in this morning's *Montreal Gazette* about students having to submit an eligibility certificate to attend English CEGEP. Bill 96 has been adopted into law so now anyone wanting to attend a CEGEP or private school in English will have to have an eligibility certificate.

He advised that any secondary V student currently living in the Laval, Laurentides or Lanaudière regions can contact this school board about the criteria required to obtain a certificate of eligibility. The deadline to provide a certificate of eligibility is June 30, 2023, and, so far, twenty requests have been received.

He went on to present his monthly report noting:

- November 29, 2022 Attended the inauguration of the Sensory Room at Souvenir Elementary School with Commissioner Vincent Cammisano and the Assistant Director General:
- November 29, 2022 A virtual public assembly was held with the families and employees
 of Franklin Hill, Joliette, Laurentia, Pierre Elliott Trudeau, Pinewood and Rawdon
 Elementary Schools to look at the proposed school attendance zone for the new school in
 Saint-Lin-Laurentides (the new school).

Since the public assembly, the Ministère de l'Éducation (MEQ) has replied to a letter from the Council requesting additional funding for the new school given that the lowest conformable tender bid received to construct this new school is well above the amount approved and financed by the MEQ. The MEQ supports the construction of the new school but declined the request for additional funding and suggested that a new tender be called. As the Chairperson, he sent a letter to Bernard Drainville, Ministre de l'Éducation, reinforcing the impact that construction delays will have on the students and the schools involved. The Premier, the Liberal Party of Québec, Members of the National Assembly for the Laurentian and Lanaudière regions, the sous-ministre, Ministère de l'Éducation, and the sous-ministre adjointe, Gouvernance des infrastructures, Ministère de l'Éducation, were copied on this letter.

The Governing Boards of the schools involved have each adopted a resolution supporting the school board's request for additional funding, as has the Parents' Committee;

- December 2, 2022 Attended a meeting of the Quebec English School Boards Association (QESBA). At the meeting:
 - Members were advised that a meeting with the Ministre de l'Éducation took place on December 8, 2022. An update of what was discussed will be provided in the new year;
 - A letter was sent requesting a meeting with the new Minister Responsible for Relations with English-speaking Quebecers, Éric Girard;
 - Reiteration of the importance of signing an open letter to David Lametti, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada, requesting that the references to Québec's Charter of the French Language be dropped from the proposed changes to the Official Languages Act, Bill C-13;
 - The ongoing fundraising campaign for the Bill 40 legal case;
 - The 2023 QESBA/AAESQ Spring Conference will be held at the Manoir St-Sauveur May 17 and 18, 2023.

In closing, he noted that the past few years have not been easy and thanked the students, parents, employees and stakeholders for being understanding and supportive. Also to be thanked is the leadership of the school Board, the Director General and the Assistant Director General, for their unwavering support of the Council.

Community Comments

- Commissioner Olivia Landry noted that Rosemere High School will be holding its annual community breakfast for the Children's Wish Foundation on Friday, December 23, 2022;
- Commissioner James Di Sano extended best wishes for the holiday season from the President and the members of the Board of Directors of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier Foundation;
- Commissioner Bob Pellerin had the pleasure of being invited to a community fair at Joliette High School. The fair was held on the evening of parent-teacher interviews.

In response to questions, the Chairperson noted

- It is hoped that a response to the additional letter sent by the school board to the MEQ will be received soon.
- A new tender will be called in January 2023;
- A visit to Laurentia Elementary School was organized by Parent Commissioner Tara Anderson, who is also the Governing Board Chairperson at the school. The Director of Material Resources and Transportation and the Chairperson of the Parents' Committee were also present and everyone saw first-hand what is faced daily by the students and employees. After the tour, it became very apparent that there is no space left in this school as students are working in the corridors, which would not be seen as acceptable by the MEQ;
- A tender is valid for 45 days after it is opened and, if no contract is awarded, the tender expires and a new call for tender must be published;
- An invitation has been extended to the Ministre de l'Éducation to visit the schools to show how much this new school is needed;
- Providing pictures of daily life in the schools that will feed to the new school may help sensitize the MEQ to the urgent need.

Commissioner Olivia Landry suggested that a letter also be sent to the former Chairperson of the school board, Jennifer Maccarone, as she is a member of the Québec Liberal Party and the MNA for Westmount-Saint-Louis.

6.0 Report from the Director General

The Director General presented her monthly report highlighting:

Orientation 1: Retain and support quality employees

- On November 28, 2022, the Human Resources Department organized a hybrid recruitment event that saw seventeen potential administrators attend, thirteen internal and four external. There were breakout sessions with current administrators so that questions could be asked. A post-event survey was sent out and the feedback received was very positive;
- The school board has updated its Career Section on its website to make it easier to apply for any positions available. The website also lists six advantages to working for this school board;

Orientation 3: Develop a learning and working environment that promotes health, safety and well-being

 The information about the new school in Saint-Lin-Laurentides can be found on the school board website. The website will be updated as new information becomes available;

Upcoming Events

- The development of a new Commitment-to-Success Plan (CTSP) for 2023-2027 is underway. Phase 1: The survey of stakeholders has been completed and the feedback vetted to derive the top items that should be included in the new CTSP. A big thank you to everyone who took the time to take the survey;
- On January 25, 2023, Phase 2 of the CTSP will take place with a virtual Town Hall.

The Director General wished everyone a very happy holiday season.

WHEREAS the Governance and Ethics Committee reviewed the 2021-2022 Annual Report of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board at its meeting of December 7, 2022, and provided feedback;

Commissioner Bob Pellerin MOVED THAT, on the recommendation of the Governance and Ethics Committee, the Council of Commissioners of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board adopt the 2021-2021 Annual Report of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board, as per document no. CC-SWLSB-2022/12/14-CA0002.

Carried unanimously

8.1.2 Public Presentation of the 2021-2022 Annual Report

The Chairperson advised those present that, as per section 220 of the Education Act, every school board and centre de services scolaire must do an annual report to account for the implementation of its Commitment-to-Success Plan (CTSP) and results it has obtained through the CTSP when compared to the objectives and targets within and with those of the MEQ. While COVID-19 was present for a portion of the current CTSP, it did not prevent the school board from being able to meet objectives and targets. He again thanked all stakeholders for their resilience and for taking the challenges head-on.

The 2021-2022 Annual Report will be posted on the website tomorrow.

He went on to present the Message from the Chairperson noting:

- The school elections that were to take place on November 1, 2020, were postponed to September 26, 2021. The election was only for the position of Chairperson as all other Commissioners had been elected by acclamation. A by-election in electoral division 6 was held on June 12, 2022, after a resignation;
- Creation of the Central Students' Committee to encourage students to participate in not
 just their school or centre but the Council of Commissioners;
- Acquisition of land for a new elementary school in Saint-Lin-Laurentides. A public
 consultation for the school zone will be held and if everything goes according to plan the
 new school will open in the fall of 2024;
- Kindergarten 4 is a very popular program in Laval, Laurentides and Lanaudière. In 2018-2019, there were only five cases and now all 26 elementary schools have the program, which translates into 45 classes. This is very good for the anglophone community and school board enrolment:
- The graduation and qualification rates are rising. At this time, the rate is 88.1 percent, which puts this school board in the number one spot for the Laval, Laurentides and Lanaudière region and in the top ten provincially. This is a testament to the efforts and creativity of everyone at the school board because our students are engaged;
- The 2nd Embracing Diversity Conference was held on January 7, 2022, for school board employees and January 18, 2022, for families. More than 100 families attended.

The Director of Pedagogical Services presented and reviewed the Pedagogical Services piece of the Annual Report as follows:

Objective 1: By 2030, reduce the gap in success rates between various groups of students by 50%

- The results in achieving the MEQ targets show that
 - There is still a gap in the success rate between boys and girls, with the boys being less successful. Everyone is working hard to decrease this gap;
 - The gap between special education students and regular students needs to be decreased;
 - The gap between students who live in areas that are a 7 or more on the socioeconomic scale versus those who do not live in these areas needs to be reduced by 50 percent.
- How a cohort works. The cohort on which the data presented this evening began in 2013
 and concluded in 2022 but, unfortunately, all the data on the results for this group will not
 be available for another two years, as a cohort is always two years behind;
- There is no non-binary data;

- The girls were outdoing the boys provincially by 10.1 percent when the cohort began but
 the boys have improved by 2.7 percent so the gap is now 8.8 percent, which does not meet
 the MEQ goal of 6.1 percent. This does not mean that the boys are not doing well, it just
 means that the girls are doing better;
- EHDAA (en difficulté d'adaptation ou d'apprentissage) students are those with an IEP (Individual Education Plan) or who are coded. The gap for this group is very large and has improved for this cohort but it did not meet the goal set by the MEQ;
- Overall, the school board has surpassed its targets;

Objective 2: By 2030, reduce to 10% the proportion of students starting public secondary school at age 13 or older

- These are students who are retained at the elementary level;
- This school board does not have a retention mentality. The 2021 results show that the school board continues to maintain results below its target of five percent and is currently at 3.3 percent, which far exceeds the provincial target;

Objective 3: By 2030, have 85% of students under the age of 20 obtain a first diploma (SSD or DVS), and 90% obtain a first diploma or qualification

 The school board has been able to increase its graduation rate from 87.7% in 2019 to 88.1% in 2020, which surpassed the target set for 2022 of 88%;

Objective 4: By 2030, increase to 90% the success rate on the composition component of the Elementary 6 (Cycle 3, Year 2) language of instruction ministerial examination in the public system.

- Due to the pandemic, there is no ministerial data for English Language Arts (ELA) or French Second Language (FSL) competencies;
- The ELA results have been impressive since 2016 but there is no current data due to COVID-19 although the school board is close to its target of 92.5 percent;
- There has been a dip in FSL and this will need to be worked upon to get back on track.

The Director of Pedagogical Services noted that the results for the school board show that students are achieving success especially when compared with the provincial results.

The Director of Material Resources and Transportation provided information on the Material Resources piece of the annual report:

Objective 5: By 2030, ensure that all school buildings are in good condition

- The school board is working on improving its infrastructure and has recently invested \$11,300,000.00 in eleven of its schools and centres;
- This objective can be a challenge given the age of some of the buildings but the Material Resources and Transportation Department works diligently to carry out as many improvements as possible;
- In 2022 the government implemented the Gestion des infrastructures de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur (GIEES) to replace its former system. All of the school board buildings have been inspected, as per the GIEES parameters, and the results are currently being analyzed.

The Director of Financial Resources presented the finance statement of principle for the 2021-2022 school year noting that \$214,539,945.00 in revenues was received versus \$208,055,753.00 in expenses leaving an accounting surplus of \$6,484,192.00. The school board needs to be careful because it is always necessary to restate and isolate revenues that pertain to the previous school year. This means that the school board has an actual deficit of \$1,600,000.00.

The Chairperson thanked the Directors for their presentation of the 2021-2022 Annual Report.

He went on to thank all school board employees for their resilience and remaining professional throughout COVID-19 noting that it does not matter what role one plays within the school board everyone is valued.

He also thanked the Commissioners for their continued support of English education and the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board.

In response to a question from Commissioner Donna Anber, the Director of Pedagogical Services noted that the terms used to describe special needs are sometimes lost in the translation from French to English making them appear to be harsh. It is hoped that these terms will become softer over time.
