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Message from the Chairperson



Dear SWLSB Stakeholders,

This past year has been a period of growth and achievement for the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board (SWLSB). As we look back on the 2022-2023 school year, we are proud to see how our collective efforts have brought much success across our schools and centres.

We are proud to report that our graduation and qualification rate has increased to 88.3%. This progress is encouraging as it means we are on track to reach our target of 89.9% by 2027. The closer we get to this target, the more challenging it is, but we are confident that we will achieve it.

In 2022-2023 we continued addressing our growing student population in the Laurentians and Lanaudière regions. Growth is excellent news for the English community, however, with it comes the need for more space.

In the Laurentians, we had a pressing need for additional space at Laurentia Elementary School in Saint-Jérôme. Since 2017, its student population has been growing. The modular classrooms installed were still not sufficient to meet the needs of the newly added groups. Consequently, we leased and renovated a building adjacent to Laurentia Elementary School to create 3 additional classrooms, an office for professionals and additional parking. Our teams worked tirelessly during the year to make sure the new building was ready for the start of the 2023-2024 school year. This expansion was needed to ensure our students had an optimal learning environment with enough space.

Overcrowding in our Lanaudière elementary schools was another major focus. In April 2023, we began building a new elementary school in Saint-Lin-Laurentides on land we acquired in May 2022. This new school will have a capacity of 384 students, 16 classrooms, 8 collaborative rooms, 1 library, 2 sensory rooms, a double gymnasium, and so much more.

This multimillion-dollar project required two public calls to tender due to the initial bids exceeding the budget authorized by the Ministère de l'Éducation (MEQ). This situation was primarily due to the budget allocation being established pre-COVID, without accounting for the unprecedented hike in construction costs that followed. The first tender was quoted at \$29,114,000, significantly over the government-authorized \$22,277,540. After careful deliberation and a commitment to fiscal responsibility, we managed to secure a more favourable bid of \$26,955,000 in the second tender, which was approved by the MEQ.

In parallel to the tendering process, in November, we conducted a town hall meeting to present the attendance zone for the new school. Stakeholders of the six schools impacted by rezoning, namely Joliette, Pinewood, Franklin Hill, Laurentia, Pierre Elliott Trudeau, and Rawdon Elementary Schools, were consulted. A public consultation which ended on March 17, 2023, took place to establish the school attendance zone. This collaborative effort, which ensured a well-thought-out approach to the rezoning, led to the adoption of a final school attendance zone at the Council meeting held on June 21, 2023.

Another major undertaking was defining the new Commitment to Success Plan (CTSP). The CTSP working table comprised of school, centre, and department administrators was created to develop a plan that was not only aligned with the Ministry's Strategic Plan but also catered to the needs of our students. The working table conducted a detailed survey to collect feedback and suggestions, receiving input from over 2,300 stakeholders who shared their priorities. Through meticulous analysis, the committee extracted the survey results into three orientations and nine strategic objectives:

- 1. Support and increase the success of diverse learners and at-risk students academically, socially, and emotionally.
- 2. Attract, retain, and support quality employees.
- 3. Ensure all students possess strong bilingual competency and proficient French skills by the time they graduate, enabling them to thrive in Québec.

Prior to the official launch, the CTSP was adopted by the Council and submitted to the MEQ for approval. In parallel to the development of the CTSP, school and centre teams began working on their educational projects, aligning them with the school board's three orientations. This concerted effort underscores our unwavering commitment to excellence, ensuring that the CTSP serves as a guiding light for the success and growth of every member of our community.

Another initiative of the Council we are proud of is the creation of the Central Students' Committee. This was the second year of this committee. Led by the chair, commissioner James Di Sano, it included commissioners Olivia Landry, Vincent Cammisano, and Stéphane Henley, as well as 6 students. They met 3 times this year, reinforcing student involvement in our decision-making processes. Topics discussed during these meetings included financial literacy, fostering student leadership and involvement, environmental issues and ways to increase psychological support resources and physical activity within our schools. This year, the Council elected two student commissioners who play an instrumental part in the Central Students' Committee and represent students on the Council of Commissioners.

During the first Parents' Committee meeting in October 2022, elections were held for the 2-year parent commissioner mandate. Re-elected were Tara Anderson, as Elementary Parent Commissioner, and Stéphane Henley, as Parent Commissioner representing parents of students with special needs. Chloée Alary was elected to the position of Secondary Parent Commissioner. These three Parent Commissioners were sworn in at the November 2022 Council meeting.

In June 2023, the Director General, Ms. Gaëlle Absolonne announced her resignation after a 25-year journey with the SWLSB. Ms. Absolonne's unwavering dedication and impactful contributions in her various roles over the years have been instrumental to our school board's success. Her legacy is one of commitment and positive influence, and we thank her sincerely for her years of service and loyalty. Mr. Frédéric Greschner, the Assistant Director General, assumed the role of interim Director General while the position was being filled. The Council extends its heartfelt appreciation to Ms. Absolonne for her invaluable service and thanks Mr. Greschner for taking over the responsibilities of this role to ensure continuity and a seamless transition for our school board.

In closing, the Council of Commissioners extends its deepest gratitude to all SWLSB employees. Your commitment, dedication and hard work contribute to making our school board a GREAT PLACE TO WORK, LEARN and GROW!

2018-2022 Commitment-to-Success Plan

The first version of the 2018-2022 Commitment-to-Success Plan (CTSP) was adopted by the Council of Commissioners on June 27, 2018.

In the preparation stages, students, parents, staff, governing board members, alumni and community stakeholders, including elected officials, were consulted on the direction and orientations that should be the focus of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board. Following approval by the Ministère de l'Éducation du Québec (MEQ), the final version of the plan was adopted by the Council on October 18, 2018.

The CTSP includes five orientations and five objectives (as illustrated below) aligned with those of the MEQ to ensure improved student success rates.

The 2022-2023 Annual Report focuses on the school board's results achieved in the fourth year of the 2018-2022 Commitment-to-Success Plan.

2022-2023 is the last year of the current CTSP. A new CTSP will be in place as of next year.

OSEntreprendre Challenge 2023 Council of Commissioners' Meeting | May 31, 2023

Many Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board schools participate in the OSEntreprendre Challenge, a major Québec movement that acknowledges the entrepreneurial initiatives of thousands of participants each year, across the province. The Council of Commissioners recognized SWLSB's two winning projects:

- **Twin Oaks Elementary School** for their project "Nature of Kindness Ornaments" where grade 2 students were engaged in kindness projects such as leaving scarves in a park for the less fortunate and making sandwiches for them.
- Joliette High School for their Talent Show which raised \$5,000 for La Soupière-Joliette, a local community soup kitchen which serves meals and provides food baskets to those in need. The secondary 4 and 5 students also volunteered their time at La Soupière-Joliette.

- Laval Senior Academy hosted the 2023 Montreal Regional Science and Technology Fair, which took place from March 26 to 28. Over 100 students from 13 high schools and colleges participated. LSA students performed exceptionally well. Thank you to the steering committee for organizing such a remarkable annual event.
- Lake of Two Mountains High School students participated in the CRC Robotics Competition "Avia 2023", which took place in Laval from February 16 to 18, 2023. 10 junior and 14 senior students participated in the competition and demonstrated their passion and dedication to the field of robotics. They came back with THREE awards.



LGBTQ+ Initiatives Grant

Council of Commissioners' Meeting | June 21, 2023

The Council of Commissioners recognized the achievements of the PSD Social Services Officer, Melanie Bujold, CDC Lachute Teacher, Charlene O'Hanley and students Seth Mayo and Leo Scharley for obtaining a \$10,000 grant for LGBTQ+ initiatives at CDC Lachute and SWLSB high schools. The grant is awarded by "IT GETS BETTER CANADA".

In addition, CDC Lachute and nine SWLSB high schools will receive a \$500 starter kit for the creation of a LGBTQ+ club.

OBJECTIVE 1:

By 2030, reduce the gap in success rates between various groups of students by 50%

The Ministry of Education has identified certain groups of students who do not meet the criteria to graduate and has established a 50% reduction in identified gaps. All students have our commitment to their individual success and as such, we will follow suit and ensure the principles of equity and equal opportunity are present for all students.

RESULTS: The 2021 results for the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board indicate a 4.2% gap between the graduation rate of girls and boys. This represents a 7.2% point decrease from the gap reported in 2020 (11.4%).

The gap between the graduation rate of students with handicaps, social maladjustments or learning difficulties and students without an IEP has increased by 10.6% points from the previous year (16.6% reported gap in 2020)¹. Despite an increase in this gap in the 2021 results, these figures indicate that we are currently close (1.8% points away) from meeting our 2022 target between these two groups of students.

In addition, we reported a 16.3%-point gap between the success rates of students who began their secondary schooling in a low socio-economic (milieu défavorisé) area compared to students from other areas. We are 6.1% points away from meeting our 2022 goal of a 10.2%.

The effects of the COVID pandemic and the cessation of courses in March 2020, especially in certification requirements courses, may explain the increase in the gaps.

It is likely that the disruption to learning was disproportionately higher and more impactful on those students who were already facing challenges in their learning and those from a disadvantaged socio-economic milieu.

OBJECTIVE 2:

By 2030, reduce to 10% the proportion of students starting public secondary school at age 13 or older

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board adheres to research-based practices and therefore does not promote the retention of students. Although certain decisions are made to retain a student, these are done for exceptional reasons and in these cases do contribute to positive outcomes, particularly where environmental stagnation or changes may be harmful to some students who identify as students with handicaps, social maladjustments or learning disabilities.

RESULTS: The 2022 results indicate that the proportion of students who start public secondary school at age 13 or older in the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board is 3.3%.

As our established target was to keep the percentage of students starting public secondary school at age 13 or older below 5%, we continue to be successful in this regard and are consistently outperforming the province as a whole.

OBJECTIVE 3:

By 2030, have 85% of students under the age of 20 obtain a first diploma (SSD or DVS), and 90% obtain a first diploma or qualification

At SWLSB, our focus is on maintaining and exceeding our reported graduation rate in 2021 (based on the 2014 cohort) of 88.1%. We continue to focus on the implementation of Professional Learning Communities (PLC) in order to build a results-based culture at the school level. Teachers are encouraged to continue using formative and summative assessments as well as the practice of providing feedback to students so that they can improve their learning. We expect to see an increase in the success rate of the various subjects, resulting in an increased graduation rate.

RESULTS: The 2021 graduation rate of students under the age of 20 obtaining a first diploma or qualification (based on the cohort of students entering Secondary 1 in the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board by September 30, 2014) is 88.1%. This current graduation rate has been stable over the past two years. The current results indicate that we have attained and surpassed our 2022 graduation rate target of 88.0%.

OBJECTIVE 4:

By 2030, increase to 90% the success rate on the composition component of the Elementary 6 (Cycle 3, Year 2) language of instruction ministerial examination in the public system

The SWLSB offers students an English education and a bilingual future. Our Secondary 5 English Language Arts and French Second Language subjects continue to yield results in the 90 percentiles. Measured at the end of Cycle 3, we maintain high results in both languages.

Supporting English and French language teaching and learning and providing early interventions will help us maintain the current course success rates. SWLSB continues to promote collaboration between language teachers at all levels in order to ensure our schools produce bilingual students.

RESULTS: The 2022 data on the ELA written competency reveals that we have exceeded our 2030 target of 90% by 4% points.

We continue to track the success rates of written and interaction components in both ELA and FSL, and remain committed to promoting the highest levels of linguistic competence in both languages.


OBJECTIVE 5:

By 2030, ensure that all school buildings are in good condition

The age and condition of many of our buildings represent a challenge for providing a 21st century learning environment. Moreover, universal design principles were not considered in 20th century building and infrastructure design. Upgrades to our buildings continue to take place annually based on the available funding.

To bring our schools and centres up to the satisfactory level of the Facility Condition Index, the Material Resources and Transportation Department continues to work diligently to carry out many projects such as roofing, window replacement, brick pointing, foundation work, classroom renovations, washroom renovations and auditorium renovations.

Implemented in 2022, the new GIEES (Gestion des infrastructures de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur) system replaces the former ministerial system, SIMACS. All our buildings were inspected according to the new GIEES parameters and the results are currently under analysis.

Adult Education and Vocational Training

Adult Education

With continued challenges resulting from a long pandemic, the Adult Education centres focused on learning and working environments that promoted health, safety and well-being.

Individual and group support was provided to students thanks to our professionals and local community organizations such as Travail de rue de l'île de Laval (TRIL).

We partnered with local organizations to reintroduce extracurricular activities and workshops such as the Lunch and Learn series in cooperation with Carrefour jeunesse-emploi, art therapy, yoga classes, photography classes, music lessons and financial series workshops.

Once sanitary measures permitted, we strove to break isolation and create a sense of community by initiating opportunities for social interactions such as picnics, rummage sales, BBQs and field trips.

In spite of environmental and learning difficulties and the irregularities of the year, 1,341 students at CDC Vimont and 230 students at CDC Lachute wrote summative exams and received Ministry credits for various secondary level courses.

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board has been actively providing a diverse range of vocational training programs across multiple centres, including Pont-Viau, Laval, Saint-Eustache, and Terrebonne. The 15 programs offered cater to the career needs of adult learners aged 20 and above. The previous year registered an increase in student enrolment, notably in the Health, Assistance and Nursing, Accounting, Secretarial, and Computing Support sectors.

Adapting to market trends, SWLSB now offers some vocational training courses through virtual and hybrid models, witnessing increased enrolment in programs like Starting a Business, Professional Sales, Customer Service, Accounting, Secretarial Studies, and Construction Business Management. The hybrid model, combining physical and online instruction, is popular, particularly in the Computing Support program.

The success rate of students in 2021-2022 reached 72.6%, reflecting an improvement from the previous year as the education sector emerged from the pandemic's impact. Health sector programs, especially Health, Assistance and Nursing, remain popular with waiting lists both locally and internationally. SWLSB is addressing the demand for healthcare attendants through English instruction, focusing on essential courses like Administration of Medications and Invasive Assistive Care Services (Bill 90).

The construction sector programs, offered in various disciplines, are in high demand and meet industry needs. Two new programs in Stationary Engine Mechanics and Machining were launched in 2023 in partnership with CFP des Moulins in Mascouche.

SWLSB actively engages in career exploration activities, promotional campaigns, and local advertising to recruit students. The high student retention rate is attributed to academic, guidance, and social service support. Numerous career fairs and events have been attended, showcasing programs such as Computing Support and Health, Assistance and Nursing.

In response to student needs, a cooking class and outdoor exercise classes were initiated, promoting a healthier lifestyle. Promo Santé partnered to provide funding for cooking classes, which are held weekly. The Pont-Viau centre created promotional videos and capsules to inform potential students about the school and its programs.

Partnerships with community organizations like Groupe Priorité Travail, YES (Youth Employment Services), and Autorité des Marchés Financiers enhance the learning experience. YES rents spaces for entrepreneurship coaching sessions, and financial literacy workshops are offered by the Canadian Revenue Agency. Collaborations with the Kanesatake community focus on promoting programs in Institutional and Home Care Assistance with an emphasis on indigenous culture.

Recognition of Acquired Competencies (RAC) programs continue to grow, with 71 registered candidates since August 2023. SWLSB's dedicated team ensures that students transition well prepared and confident with the necessary technical and workplace skills for success.

We welcomed 23 international students registered in the youth sector from Brazil, Australia, Cambodia, Korea, Italy, China, Germany, Vietnam, Ghana and Sweden.

Vocational Sector

In the vocational sector, we welcomed 60 new international students from India, Pakistan, Philippines, Colombia, China, Cameroon and Sri Lanka.

The international students were enrolled in the following programs:

- Health Assistance and Nursing
- Carpentry
- Secretarial Studies
- Accounting

Summary

International student enrolment began recovering from the decline caused by the pandemic in previous years. In the youth sector, the number of students remained stable. In vocational training, the number of students tripled from 2021-2022 to 2022-2023. Most of our promotional efforts were put in the vocational training sector as trends showed a faster recovery in this sector.

Business Training Services

The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board offers customized training and coaching services to businesses across the Laval, Laurentides and Lanaudière territories through its business training division: QUALIFICACTION. Since its launch in 2014, QUALIFICACTION has continued to grow, going from \$36,000 in revenues to \$1,427,905 in 2022-2023, representing an increase of 11.6% from the previous year, and generated a profit of \$220,743.

2022-2023 presented several challenges for the business training division, including staffing changes and operational adjustments. Despite these, we continued to maintain strong partnerships and successfully launched 90 francization courses, 75 in Laval and 15 in the Laurentides, which include 5 public cohorts for temporary foreign workers. A new Project Development Officer is expected to join the team in the upcoming year, contributing to our ongoing commitment to excellence in service delivery.


Another major change this year is the transition of francization services from Services Québec to a new entity, Francisation Québec. We will adapt our offer accordingly and continue to serve the needs of businesses in this regard.

This year, the team at QUALIFICACTION decided to update its mission and vision statements, as well as core business values to better reflect our adaptability to meet the changing needs of the job market. Our mission is to give momentum to organizations through trainings that promote human achievement in the workplace. We aspire to become a renowned reference in the business training sector.

We continue to be proactive and creative in the field of personalized training and coaching services we provide to our clients. Next year we will be extending our offer of service by adding trainings in Artificial Intelligence (AI) and subsidized programs aimed at upgrading basic skills (literacy, numeracy and technology). The calming effects of such a room help them to focus on the present moment so they can be better prepared for learning and interacting with others.

In June 2023, the Sir Wilfrid Laurier Foundation Ambassadors' Club was launched in support of our Foundation's vital initiatives. Members of the Ambassadors' Club have a shared passion for education and contribute significantly to our cause. Members' involvement can make a profound impact on our ability to further the legacy of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier Foundation and uphold its values of supporting education.

Parents' Committee Report



Parents' Committees (PC) have existed across Québec since 1972. In accordance with the province's *Education Act,* every school holds a general assembly before September 30 of each school year. It is at these assemblies that parents/guardians are elected to the school Governing Boards (GB). From among the GB members, each school elects one member (and optionally one substitute) to represent the school on the school board's Parents' Committee. The Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) also elects one member to be a part of the PC.

The PC holds a unique role within public education governance, as it is the only committee comprised entirely of parents/guardians. Annually, the PC elects a leadership team and numerous subcommittees to guide it through the year.

The Parents' Committee is consulted by the school board on a wide range of topics that benefit our children. Furthermore, the PC undertakes to advocate for all parents. Aside from monthly meetings which are publicly accessible, the PC maintains contact with its community through a section on the school board website, a Facebook page, as well as occasional mass emails. To provide more opportunities for our members to benefit from each other's knowledge and discuss additional topics of interest, the PC began hosting regular (optional) caucuses to supplement regular monthly meetings. This initiative proved to be highly successful and contributed to overall team success.

In 2022-2023, the parents' committee held 10 meetings.

Anti-Bullying and Anti-Violence Plans - Complaints


In conformity with the *Education Act*, the governing board of each school approves an anti-bullying and anti-violence plan on an annual basis. When incidents occur that have been determined as incidents of violence or bullying, all schools must diligently apply the intervention protocol as well as the supervisory and support measures stated in the plan while taking into consideration the context in which the alleged incidents occurred.

During the 2022-2023 school year, a total of 41 complaints related to incidents of bullying and 16 complaints related to incidents of violence were filed and processed by the Department of School Affairs and School Organization of the school board in accordance with by-law no. BL2009-CA-19: *By-law Establishing Procedures for the Examination of Complaints from Students or Their Parents.* Out of these 57 complaints, none were processed by the Student Ombudsman.

To ensure that due process is applied, parents are required to follow the steps outlined in the by-law before referring the matter to the Student Ombudsman.



These parameters take into account the distinctive features of each school and centre. Allocations are built on a base and/or a per-student allocation adjusted in consideration of social and economic disparities.

The budgetary process encourages responsibility, accountability, innovation, creativity and transparency.
