Parent Commissioner Tara Anderson MOVED THAT the minutes of the regular meeting of the Council of Commissioners of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board held on January 29, 2025, having been received by all members prior to this meeting, be approved as written and exempt from public reading by the Secretary General. Seconded by Parent Commissioner Chloée Alary.

3.0 Presentation of the Report of the Regional Student Ombudsman

The Chairperson welcomed the Regional Student Ombudsman (RSO), Catherine Labelle, to the meeting. The region served by Ms. Labelle is the Région des Prairies-et-des-Îles (the Region) which includes the Laval, Laurentides, and Lanaudière regions.

The RSO advised that she would take questions throughout her presentation.

This is the first Annual Report of the RSO and covers the period of July 2023 to June 2024. The RSO treats complaints made by students and/or their parents and is an impartial party who treats complaints with the highest confidentiality. The information received can be very sensitive so the rights of the student and/or their parents need to be respected. It is very important to have everything in writing concerning a complaint.

The RSO explained how the four-step complaint process works noting that the RSO can examine a complaint without it ever having been through steps one and two of the process. If the RSO feels that the interventions at these steps will not adequately correct the situation or that the time it takes to complete these steps will make their intervention pointless. The RSO will immediately take a complaint that deals with sexual violence.

As of April 2024, the RSO has been serving approximately 120,000 students who are part of two school service centres, one school board, and 16 private institutions, noting that the collaboration is very good. The RSO works for those who make the complaint and for all the students who may benefit from the outcome.

The RSO presented the highlights of the main statistics for 2023-2024:

- 88 complaints and reports were received and 40 have ended;
- The ratio of complaints and reports per 1,000 students is 0.73;
- 68 of the complaints and reports received had grounds and 38.2 percent were deemed substantiated;
- 68 recommendations were made to educational organizations:
 - 95.6 percent or 65 of the recommendations were fully or partially accepted, and 100 percent or 65 of the accepted recommendations were fully or partly implemented;
- Public versus private the majority of the complaints and reports come from the public sector;

In response to a question from the Alternate Student Representative to Council, the RSO advised that for complaints or reports that received recommendations for resolution, a meeting was held with all parties to ensure that said recommendations were implemented. Complaints and reports without grounds are to be closed before June 30.

In response to a question from Commissioner Donna Anber regarding collaboration with Youth Protection, the RSO noted that the school principal is contacted and the details are collected, which are then shared with Youth Protection. The RSO keeps Youth Protection up to date on the progress of the case. The RSO also noted that Youth Protection therefore always receives at least two notices (from the school and from the RSO).

The RSO specified the following:

- Education Organizations' Legal obligations
 - Ensure that at the beginning of each school year students and their parents are informed that recourse exists:
 - Ensure that promotional posters are on display;
 - Ensure that the recourse process is promoted on each educational organization's website.
- Actions by the National Student Ombudsman and the Regional Student Ombudspersons
 - Provide promotional posters for the 3,200 schools;
 - Provide material for websites and school agendas;
 - Hold meetings with each region's key players in education;
- Other activities that may be completed by the Regional Student Ombudspersons:
 - Processing of requests for opinions under section 19 of the Act respecting the National Student Ombudsman (the Act) received from a Council of Commissioners, a governing board, a parents' committee, a students' committee or a private educational institution on matters related to the services provided to students, homeschooled children or their parents;
 - Pursuing investigations on their own initiative, as per section 46 of the Act.

The RSO advised that the easiest way to get information quickly is to go to the website of the National Student Ombudsman.

The Chairperson thanked the RSO for taking the time to be present this evening and for her clear and informative presentation.

4.0 Public Presentation of the 2023-2024 Annual Report

The Chairperson opened the public presentation of the 2023-2024 Annual Report of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board by welcoming everyone to the meeting and stating the following:

As per **article 220** of the Education Act, every school board and school service centre shall prepare an annual report giving its stakeholders the data about its Commitment-to-Success Plan and the results obtained in each of its objectives.

The annual report is an opportunity to look back at our results and ensure that we are in line with our school board objectives as well as targets set by the Ministry of Education. The 2023-2024 annual report focuses on results of year one of the 2023-2027 Commitments to Success Plan.

This annual report presents results covering the period from July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024, and is a testimony to the incredible work that has been accomplished during that time. The complete annual report is available on our website.

He drew attention to some of the annual report's highlights, as found on pages 3 and 4, notably:

- The launch of the 2023-2027 Commitment-to-Success Plan: this plan is the school board's commitment to educational excellence and well-being of its diverse community and outlines three primary orientations emphasizing the priorities of the school board for the next four years:
 - Orientation 1: Students: Increasing the success of all learners, especially those at risk, through academic, social, and emotional support.
 - Orientation 2: Employees: Prioritizing the attraction, retention, and support of highquality staff as a cornerstone of the school board's success.
 - Orientation 3: Bilingualism: Ensuring students graduate with strong bilingual competencies to succeed in Québec's socio-cultural landscape
- Changes at the senior management level with a new Director General, a new Assistant Director General, a new Director of Financial Resources and a new Director of Human Resources;
- Continued commitment to advocating for Québec's anglophone community by joining the English
 Montreal School Board as an intervenor in the Bill 96 constitutional challenge as well as continuing
 to be an appellant in the appeal against Bill 40, which reinforces the school board's dedication to
 protecting the governance rights of the English school boards across Québec;
- The construction and opening of Heritage Elementary School in Saint-Lin-Laurentides. The name
 was selected through a community-wide contest which involved the participation of 260 families
 and 200 employees. The school will be inaugurated in the spring;
- The Council welcomed two new commissioners in 2023-2024: Désirée Ramacieri elected in Electoral Division no. 2, and Stéphane Henley, elected in Electoral Division no. 4. Mr. Henley had previously served as the SEAC commissioner for several years before as well.

The Chairperson invited the Director of Pedagogical Services, the Director of Financial Resources and the Director of Material Resources and Transportation to make their respective presentations.

The Director of Pedagogical Services presented the results of the first year of the 2023-2027 Commitment-to-Success Plan (CTSP) noting the following:

Orientation 1: Support and increase the success of diverse learners and at-risk students academically, socially, and emotionally

- Over 200 IEPs were sampled and the school board is not far off of the goal, but compliance needs to be worked on:
- Compliance requires that there be no personal information in the IEP.

- The results are based on what was offered by the school board during the 2023-2024 school year. The school board did not investigate if teachers undertook professional development on their own outside of what was being offered;
- The school board needs to increase its marketing on the professional development sessions being offered to teachers, so a campaign will be launched in August 2025 to promote this.

Orientation 3: Ensure all students possess strong bilingual competency and proficient French skills by the time they graduate, enabling them to thrive in Québec

The school board wants to look at being able to offer French as a Second Language (FSL) base, advanced, and enriched at the high school level with the exception of Mountainview High School and Phoenix Alternative. It wants to measure those high schools that offer advanced FSL at all levels to see how it can be implemented for the others. Currently only two of the seven high schools are offering a higher level of FSL.

The Director of Pedagogical Services advised that the goal is to have FSL base and FSL immersion for second language speakers and to move the school board towards having all high schools offer FSL immersion as the higher level of French;

In response to a question from the Alternate Student Representative to Council, the Director of Pedagogical Services noted that the reading competency of students with IEPs is being measured, but it is the teachers that are actively implementing the strategies in the classrooms for all students, so that everyone, not just those with an IEP, can benefit from it.

The Director of Pedagogical Services went on to present the results of the Strategic Plan of the Ministère de l'Éducation noting that it sets the benchmarks for the province and each school board and school service centre set theirs correlatively.

Overall, the school board is pleased with its results for the MEQ's Objective 1, as it
exceeded expectations with indicators one and two;

- For indicator three there was a dip in the success rates for students with learning difficulties between 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 due to COVID and the fact that one year they took local exams and the next provincial exams, which are much harder. An IEP Committee has been formed to restructure the process for helping students with learning difficulties be successful:
- There is a trend whereby the French sector outperforms the English in the grade 6 Math exam while the English sector outperforms the French in language;

The Director of Pedagogical Services turned the presentation over to the Director of Material Resources and Transportation.

The Director of Material Resources and Transportation commented on Objective 3 of the MEQ's Strategic Plan noting the following:

- In 2021-2022, a target was set to inspect all the school board's buildings to gather as much
 information as possible about each building in an effort to better plan future investments
 and improvements. The inspections are now complete and the results on the state of the
 buildings of the school board will be presented soon;
- In 2023-2024, over \$20.6 million was invested in the improvement and maintenance of 11 buildings. These annual investments prioritized schools with the highest levels of disrepair to ensure safe and conducive learning and working environments;
- An additional \$2 million was allocated for the installation of portable classrooms at Pierre Elliott Trudeau Elementary School to address the space requirements;
- An investment of \$38 million was made for the construction of Heritage Elementary School, a modern facility that will revitalize our infrastructure portfolio ("parc immobilier").

The Director of Material Resources and Transportation turned the presentation over to the Director of Financial Resources.

The Director of Financial Resources made the following comments:

- The school board allocates the resources at its disposal among its schools and centres in an equitable manner and in consideration of the social and economic disparities, the needs expressed by its institutions, existing partnerships and the Commitment-to-Success Plan;
- The school board reserves the amount determined necessary for its needs to administer the services entrusted to it by law and for the needs of its committees;
- The school board establishes parameters for the equitable distribution of its resources that
 ensure services to students as required by the provisions of the Education Act and school
 board policy;

- These parameters take into account the distinctive features of each school and centre.
 Allocations are built on a base and/or a per-student allocation adjusted to account for social and economic disparities;
- The budgetary process encourages responsibility, accountability, innovation, creativity, and transparency;
- The audited financial statements for 2023-2024 were approved at the December 11, 2024, meeting of the Council and indicated revenues of \$240,083,796.00 and expenses of \$238,367,961.00, resulting in a surplus of approximately \$1,700,000.00;
- The main source of revenue is an operating grant from the MEQ;
- The main expense item is teacher salaries;
- More information on the financial statement can be found on the school board's website.

The Chairperson thanked the directors for their presentations and noted that for those who wish to read the complete 2023-2024 Annual Report, which includes updates on Adult Education and Vocational Training, the International Student Program, the Sir Wilfrid Laurier Foundation, and Business Training Services, as well as the Parents' Committee report, the Ethics Commissioner report and the Anti-Bullying and Anti-Violence Plans report is available on the school board's website.

On behalf of the Council of Commissioners, the Chairperson extends his heartfelt appreciation to all Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board (SWLSB) employees for their dedication and commitment. Their hard work makes a difference every day, ensuring our students succeed and thrive.

He also thanked the commissioners for their support and dedication to English public education and the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board.

He further noted that as an SWLSB alumnus and a commissioner for many years, he has witnessed the dedication of the SWLSB community and stakeholders, and now, as Chairperson, he is proud to lead the school board and to continue working towards its shared vision of student success.

5.0 Question Period

The Secretary General and Director of the Legal, Corporate and Communications Department explained the parameters of the two question periods of 20 minutes each and drew attention to where people online can type in their questions for the second question period.

She noted that the second question period is for questions related to agenda items only. Question period is not a platform for debate.

The Secretary General and Director of the Legal, Corporate and Communications Department advised that a question was received prior to the deadline from Renata Isopo.

Question: While I appreciate your general references to the cuts that have to be made to bring \$1,519,843 to 0.00, could you clarify why it has been imposed on the schools and centres to absorb 2/3 of the cuts, while the 'department', which I assume is the school board level administrative/directive Human Resources, is only asked to cut back 1/3 of the total reduction.

Specifically, why are the schools being asked to cut 60% and only 40% at the administrative level?

The Chairperson advised that this question has been answered by the Communications Coordinator on February 21st by email. Although the administrative centre's expenses represent only 4.67% of the School Board's total expenses, it is absorbing 1/3 of the cuts. This is a considerable contribution considering how the school board's budget is distributed. As already mentioned, the administrative centre provides essential services that directly support schools, centres, students, parents, and staff.

6.0 Report from the Chairperson

He went on to quote Mahatma Gandhi, noting that these words remind us that change starts with us, with our actions, our words, and the way we treat each other.

Be the change you wish to see in the world.

Today is *Pink Shirt Day* so these words are the perfect way to highlight its importance. He went on to note that tonight people are wearing pink to show that they stand against bullying in all of its forms, as well as for a culture of kindness, respect, and inclusion in every school, centre, and interaction. Bullying isolates and leaves lasting scars. No child should ever feel unsafe, unheard, or unwelcome which is why, as leaders, we have the duty to create environments where every student feels valued and empowered to be themselves. Speaking out rather than staying silent, choosing kindness over indifference, and ensuring that no child feels alone.

He thanked everyone for making a real change through action and for standing together to build a future where respect, inclusion, and compassion are not just an ideal, but a reality for all children.

He continued by presenting his monthly report.

7.0 Report from the Director General

The Director General presented his monthly report noting that since the beginning of the school year, the Assistant Director General and himself have visited 39 schools and centres. He also attended meetings with school board counterparts, two meetings with the Advisory Committee on Management, the Board of Directors of the Management Negotiating Committee for English-language School Boards (CPNCA) and a meeting of the Board of Directors of LEARN-Québec (Leading English Education and Resource Network). The Assistant Director General attended the Laval-Laurentides-Lanaudière Conference of Directors General and Assistant Directors Generals where the theme was Regional Development Plan and Sharing of Services.

He went on to provide background information on *Pink Shirt Day*, noting that it began in 2007 after a student in Nova Scotia was bullied for wearing a pink shirt to school and a worldwide movement was born establishing a day to take a stand against bullying. The Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board's (SWLSB) students and staff, whether in schools, centres, or the head office, all showed their support through wearing pink and various activities. The day is captured in photos posted on the schools' and centres' websites or Facebook pages.

The celebration of *Pink Shirt Day* draws attention to the fact that there are increasing levels of verbal abuse, physical violence, and incivility in society today, a phenomenon that is not limited to the SWLSB or the province, but that is also present throughout the country. This can take place student to student, student to teacher, staff member to staff member, and parents to staff. Presentations have been held with the management staff to provide the tools needed to de-escalate situations.

The SWLSB has a Policy on Safe, Caring Schools and Centres that is currently being revised to include respect and civility. The revisions to this policy will be presented to the Advisory Committee – Administration in the spring and then recommended to the Council for consultation. The consultation feedback from the school board's stakeholders and partners will help ensure that the schools and centres are as safe and caring as possible.
